WHAT IS SCOOTER SHARE?

- Dockless
- Electric powered
- 15 MPH top speed
- Upright, two-wheeled scooters
- Mobile applications
- Pay per ride
 - \$1/ride + \$.20/minute

SCOOTER SHARE OPPORTUNITIES

- Can help address the first and last mile of trips throughout the city
- Replacement of motor vehicles trips
- Relatively low cost to city
- Convenience to users
- Does scooter share contribute to city policy goals?





SCOOTER SHARE THREATS

- Safety
 - Pedestrians (Sidewalk riding)
 - Scooter riders (Street riding, helmet usage)
- Accessibility
 - Blocked sidewalks
 - Blocked bicycle racks
- Costs

EXISTING ORDINANCES AND POLICIES

- Sec. 42-88. Driving on sidewalk.
- It shall be unlawful for any person to drive a motor vehicle, moped, motorized scooter, mini motorcycle, all terrain vehicle, or similar motorized conveyance on any sidewalk except at a permanent or temporary drive. Persons may ride bicycles and mobility impairment transportation devices such as wheel chairs on the sidewalk provided that the bicycle or device is operated in a manner and at speeds which do not interfere with or endanger others use of the sidewalk.



EXISTING ORDINANCES AND POLICIES

- Sec. 42-85. Operation of motor vehicles in public parks and other publicly owned areas.
- It shall be unlawful to operate any motorcycle, motorbike, motor scooter, motorized go-cart or other motor vehicle in or on any public park, public recreation area, public school grounds or other publicly owned property within the corporate limits of the city or in or on any such property owned by the city outside the corporate limits of the city, except on the streets, parking areas or other public ways designed and intended for motor vehicular use; provided, however, that this prohibition shall not apply to:
