Winston-Salem Police Department - Units Investigating Firearm Offenses

- CID Criminal Investigations Division: Primary responsibility for major crime solution which includes investigations of homicides, robberies, burglaries, sexual assaults, etc.
- SCU Street Crimes Units: Each District is assigned a SCU responsible for concentrated enforcement of street level crime of all types throughout each District
- Gang Unit: Responsible for conducting investigations involving gangs, gang-related crimes/activity and providing intelligence on gang members being investigated by law enforcement
- SWAT Special Weapons and Tactics Team: Responsible for handling various high-risk law enforcement incidents such as armed barricaded subjects, hostage rescue, high-risk arrests, and dignitary protection

Purpose of the WSPD Gun Crime Reduction Unit (GCRU)



- Immediate response and investigation of gun crimes involving discharging firearms into a dwelling, business, vehicle, and/or incidents when an individual is injured by gun fire
- Apprehend violent offenders where the Special Weapons and Tactics Team (SWAT) has not assumed the investigation/apprehension
- Engage in proactive policing in areas where gun violence has repeatedly occurred to reduce additional gun crime incidents

A gun is fired; the sound of an explosion radiates.

Multiple
ShotSpotter

Location of gunfire is pinpointed within seconds and ShotSpotter gunfire and acoustic experts review and qualify the data

Qualified Alert quickly sent to dispatch center, PSAP, and mobile units for immediate dispatch. Within minutes officers arrive to precise gunshot location with greater situational awareness and preparedness.



Proposal for a Gun Buy-Back Initiative

2014 Gun Buy-Back Program

- 488 Total Weapons surrendered with a total of \$44,025.00 paid
- 297 Handguns (\$100.00 each paid)
- 84 Shotguns (\$75.00 each paid),
- 107 Rifles (\$75.00 each paid)
