COMMUNITY IMPACT

In 2021, Action4Equity was awarded a \$20k grant from the City of Winston-Salem's Social Justice/Anti-Poverty Funding for the purpose of operationalizing the grassroots community to pilot community-led solutions to some of our most pressing and pervasive issues.

We engaged with 49
Black owned businesses, spending over \$130,000, where a remarkable 92% of our vendors were Black-owned.

\$1.3M

Our investment in employees and contract labor reached \$1.3 million, with 91% of our full-time staff and contractors being Black, showcasing our dedication to inclusive economy

1775%

We achieved a phenomenal revenue increase of 1775%, growing from \$80,000 in 2019 to \$1.5 million in 2022, a testament to our strategic and impactful operations.

\$380

A one-time \$20,000 grant from the City of Winston Salem was effectively transformed into a total of \$7.6 million in funding over three years, demonstrating our ability to maximize funding and expand our impact.

7.6M BREAKDOWN

Action4Equity was able to transition from EMP to Full Circle Mentoring, develop civic infrastructure to solve problems raised by community, achieve major policy wins and become more sustainable by providing services to solve systemic problems vs relying solely on grant funding.

Embedded Mentor Program (WSFCS)

\$1.4M

We launched the program in four schools serving 200 youth and families with 20 mentor advocates working in the schools, communities and homes.

We Heal Together (SAMHSA)

\$4.0M

In collaboration with CTRC we furthered the work of EMP under the vision of Shantae Graham centering Full Circle Mentoring.

Private Foundations

\$1.0M

The grants received from KBR, ZSR, Winston Salem Foundation and others were used to develop the civic infrastrucutre needed for everyone to thrive together.

Service Revenue (Atrium)

\$1.2M


Atrium contracted A4E to provide community based research and interventions for black maternal health to improve on their inequtiable outcomes.

 With these connections we are able to build relationships that allow mentors to have constant updates on our scholar's progress and needs.

 There have been school check-ins for scholars via phone or in person weekly with Cares team staff, teachers, and school social workers.



STAYING CONNECTED


