

## CITY OF WINSTON-SALEM, NC 2025 FEDERAL ACTION PLAN

ISSUE	ACTION ITEMS
COMPETITIVE GRANTS, CONGRESSIONALLY DIRECTED SPENDING and SHOVEL READY PROJECTS	<ul> <li>Support all efforts by the City of Winston-Salem to secure additional federal resources for local priorities. A list of grants and projects requesting federal support will be provided and listed separately as notices for those opportunities, and the criteria for them, are announced.</li> <li>Support the continuation of the local-federal partnership, including competitive grants and congressionally directed spending/community funded projects.</li> </ul>
AFFORDABLE HOUSING and HOMELESSNESS	<ul> <li>Federal funding for permanent affordable housing, fair housing, housing for veterans, renter-to-homeownership programs, and resources to prevent and end chronic homelessness, particularly youth homelessness.</li> <li>Extend HUD audits beyond annually, which is duplicative and costly to local governments.</li> </ul>
COMMUNITY, ECONOMIC and WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT	<ul> <li>Funding for job creation, workforce development training, trade training, job placement and apprenticeship programs, as well as programs supporting youth enrichment and access.</li> <li>Increase investment in small businesses.</li> <li>Support reentry programs that focus on areas vital to reintegration back into the community, including employment, education, mentoring, substance use, and mental health treatment.</li> <li>Fund programs to restore and revitalize underserved and/or older neighborhoods, fight poverty, retrofit low-income housing and older buildings to meet code, and enhance Historic Districts.</li> <li>Expand designations in and leverage potential investments surrounding the Opportunity Zones Program.</li> <li>Support the continuation of the Public Service Loan Forgiveness (PSLF) program that serves as a vital recruitment and retention tool for local governments.</li> </ul>
PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURE	<ul> <li>TRANSPORTATION</li> <li>Investments in roads, bridges, greenways, street safety, and public transit should prioritize maintenance and upgrades to failing infrastructure. New investments needed in EV infrastructure for fleet and public.</li> <li>Support reactivating a commuter passenger rail line into the City of Winston-Salem, which is the largest city in the state's western portion without access to Amtrak.</li> <li>Support for the Winston-Salem Transit Authority.</li> <li>WATER AND SEWER</li> <li>Funding to replace lead service lines and failing infrastructure.</li> <li>Funding to assist with PFAS and PFOS detection and nutrient management.</li> </ul>

PUBLIC SAFETY	<ul> <li>POLICE DEPARTMENT</li> <li>Support federal funding to help local law enforcement agencies with crime prevention. Prioritize recruitment and retention, crime-solving technology, and fortifying/protecting WSPD properties.</li> <li>Direct more funding to Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) grant programs, Bureau of Justice Assistance grant programs, and other USDOJ grants.</li> <li>FIRE DEPARTMENT</li> <li>Direct more competitive grant funding to career fire departments and provide low or no cost match funding for fire department staff hiring and retention.</li> <li>Provide more notice prior to publishing funding opportunities, extend the typical application window, and streamline the application and award process for the Assistance to Firefighters Grants Program.</li> </ul>
QUALITY OF LIFE	<ul> <li>ARTS AND HUMANITIES</li> <li>Fund federal programs that enhance access to arts and humanities at the local level, particularly for youth career options and African American historically significant projects.</li> <li>PARKS AND RECREATION:</li> <li>Funding for local park and recreation departments to meet Americans with Disabilities Act compliance and for ongoing maintenance.</li> <li>HEALTH AND WELLNESS:</li> <li>Fund programs that increase access to healthy foods, like community-based grocery solutions and alternative food distribution models, to combat food deserts and childhood obesity.</li> <li>Support planning and programming for urban heat island reduction and extreme heat days.</li> <li>Promote citizen engagement; enhance the health and wellness of the senior population; fight substance use; and reduce suicide rates.</li> <li>Support programs to treat mental health and oppose efforts to transfer the costs for mental health treatment from the federal government to the local level.</li> <li>ENVIRONMENT:</li> <li>Support programs for energy efficiency, renewable energy, sustainability, and invasive plant removal.</li> <li>EQUALITY</li> <li>Support non-discrimination policies and human rights legislation, including, but not limited to, equality and social justice.</li> </ul>
UNFUNDED MANDATES	Oppose legislation that imposes unfunded mandates on local government.
