Program Purpose

Provide an alternative to law enforcement for non-violent mental health, substance use and domestic dispute 911 calls.

- The BEAR Team provides compassionate crisis intervention services to the individuals of Winston-Salem.

Services Provided by the Crisis Counselors

Responding to 911 calls as an alternative to law enforcement.

Supports convicted felon reentry and reintegration efforts by providing relocation support where appropriate and helps with connection to programs.

Working with families and follow up on medications compliance for teens who run away.

Assists victims of domestic violence in accessing safe havens and eliminating barriers.

Response to individuals displaying unpredictable behavior.

Redirecting and assisting clients who frequently call 911. They call the BEAR Team directly when needed, reducing the number of 911 calls.

Transporting clients to the least restrictive level of care, often avoiding unnecessary emergency department admissions.

Ensuring citizens of Winston-Salem are receiving the right level of care at the right time.

In home counseling, resources, and safety plans.

Direct Requests for Non-Emergency Services

- Re-location of unhoused individuals and assistance with resources
- Provide crisis counseling and resources as a follow up after a medical interventions.
- Attend case staffing with other mental health providers to increase support and eliminate barriers.
