DEFINING TRANSFORMATIONAL

Through the transformational grants, the City of Winston-Salem seeks to move the needle on key components of the City Strategic Plan, which trigger a profound, ripple effect of positive, multi-dimensional changes. Further, we seek to place equity at the forefront of the application, transforming historically significant and deeply disinvested low-income communities. This involves ambitious planning and action for community-wide impact.

PRELIMINARY MINIMUM ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

ONLY NON-PROFITS (501C3 AND TAX-EXEMPT FAITH BASED INSTITUTIONS) WILL BE ELIGIBLE TO APPLY.

EVALUATION AND AWARD PROCESS

- **PRELIM. REVIEW.** ARPA City Internal Task Force will review applications for meeting mínimum eligibility and submission of all required materials.
- **CORE REVIEW.** Internal Staff Team (consisting of staff members at grades 15 or above) review and score applications using the Transformational Scoring Matrix.
 - Each application will be reviewed and scored by 3 staff members. The average will be taken amongst the 3 reviews.
- □ **TIERED SCORES**. Based on the final average score of each application, all applicants and scores will be presented in three tiers for City Council review and approval.

THE FINAL RULE HAS BEEN ISSUED!!!!

- Final Rule issued 1/6/2022
 - Effective in April but can be used immediately
- Provides significantly expanded criteria for certain uses
- Provides identification of different classes of impacted persons and business types
- Timeline for expenditure stays the same:
 - Obligated by 12/31/2024
 - Spent by 12/31/2026



FINAL RULE EXPANDED ELIGIBILITY – SELECTED AREAS

- Replacement of Lost Public Sector Revenue \$10 million or more to be used for any governmental purpose
- Capital Expenditures Allowed in relation to service eligibility with no pre-approval
 - Enhanced reporting requirements for capital expenses over \$1 million
- Public Sector Capacity Employment and service delivery
 - Expanded employment, retention, and re-hiring programs
 - Data, evaluation, and outreach
- Framework for "Non-Enumerated" Uses
 - "Reasonably designed" to benefit those impacted
 - "Reasonably proportional" comparing scale of response to harm
