The Hyatt House is a modern and luxurious hotel off It features two restaurants, Hugo's Rotisserie, a Colo




FEDERAL BUILDING Visit our new Federal Building, a delightful addition to the Winston-Salem skyline.


HALL OF JUSTICE The new Hall of Justice is a \$6.3 million dollar architectural delight.



- **NO INFRINGEMENT** on private property rights
- Triggers **SECTION 106** Review
- Makes TAX CREDITS available







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
