## **Additional Accomplishments**

- Created and implemented "M/WBE
   Made Easy," a convenient online form for
   city employees to share upcoming purchase
   opportunities. This tool furthers employee
   accountability regarding staff's
   commitment to the City's procurement
   guidelines. Staff can now:
  - Utilize the Employee Center to share upcoming department needs for services and/or purchases with the M/WBE Office
  - Learn about new M/WBE firms who have registered on the City's vendor database
  - Gain assistance with identifying M/WBE firms to solicit bids
- Revised goal setting methodology for formal construction projects. Specific factors are considered when establishing justifiable M/WBE subcontracting goals.
- Targeted M/WBE firms, identified at goal setting by their scope of work, are emailed the pre-bid attendees to help facilitate the submittal of responsive quotes.
- M/WBE goals for formal projects have consistently been set above the 10 % minimum requirement.
- Enhanced Payment Verification is completed by M/WBE staff to confirm timely payments to vendors.
- Increased Site Visits are performed, including projects where an Affidavit B is submitted, to provide additional support and verify M/WBE participation and fair treatment.
- M/WBE Program Reminders included with notice of award to prime contractors. Reiterates program compliance standards applicable throughout course of contract.

# **Strength through Diversity**

The M/WBE staff identifies and recruits minority and woman owned businesses to provide support and services to assist in their development by promoting City Government contracting and subcontracting opportunities.

### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The City of Winston-Salem regularly tracks M/WBE spending in four categories: (1) Construction & Repair; (2) Subcontracting Activity; (3) Procurement Card Spending; and (4) Goods and Services. The percentage of overall spending done with M/WBE firms increased from 8% in FY 15-16 to 9% in FY 16-17.

- 1. Construction and Repair includes all active City spending on formal and informal projects. The amount spent by the City decreased from \$108,962,138 in FY 15-16 to \$70,485,700 in FY 16-17. The percentage of spending with M/WBE's decreased from 8.55% to 5.29%.
- 2. Subcontracting Activity includes all closed formal range construction projects. In this category, total spending increased \$13,459,687 in FY15-16 to \$58,250,075 in FY16-17. Of that, \$11,694,547 was spent with M/WBE businesses which accounted for 20.08% of all expenditures.
- 3. Procurement Card Spending was \$3,701,125 this year which was a slight increase from the \$3,585,339 total in FY 15-16. The \$149,958 spent with M/WBEs accounted for 4.05% of total spending, which is a decrease from the 13.12% in FY15-16.
- 4. Goods & Services includes all other City purchases. In this category, the total amount encumbered by the City in FY 16-17 was \$103,896,785. Spending with M/WBE's decreased from \$5,038,353 to \$4,890,904 which accounted for 4.71% of spending.
