Biography of Dr. Julian Carr Burroughs, Jr.

Julian Carr Burroughs, Jr. was born in Charlotte, NC, in 1928 and grew up in Rockingham, NC. After high school, he enlisted in the U.S. Army and was among the first group of "peacekeepers" sent to Korea from 1947-48. A book has been published of the letters that he and his mother wrote to each other during this period, called Sweet Dreams. After this period, Julian attended Wake Forest College in Wake Forest, NC. After his graduation in 1951, he began teaching theatre and history at Riverside Military Academy in Georgia and Williams High School in Burlington, NC. He then went to the University of Michigan for his PhD in Communications (Radio and TV); his dissertation was on the use of Educational Television and Radio in the classroom. He married Jean Miller Burroughs, who received her Masters of Music in opera from Michigan. In 1954 they had two daughters, Catherine and Lee. In 1958, Julian became part of the Wake Forest University faculty, where he taught communications for over thirty years and managed the radio station, WFDD.

Throughout his career, Julian envisioned that WFDD would play a crucial role in the Piedmont's educational development, and he produced and directed a successful series of radio programs for Winston-Salem's public schools called "Adventures in Storyland." In the summers, he directed Speech and Theatre workshops for high school students in the Winston-Salem area, and many of these students went on to careers in radio, television, and film. As an active member of national and state radio and television organizations, Julian introduced his college students to hands-on experiences in the field, including the filming of Natalie Wood's last movie, *Brainstorm* (1983), in which Julian also appears.

His most significant contribution to the Winston-Salem community was the development of WFDD into an NPR-affiliate station in 1971. WFDD is North Carolina's charter NPR affiliate station, and was the first NPR affiliate between Washington, D.C. and Tallahassee, FL. For many years, Dr. Burroughs taught his students the craft of radio production and programming through their work at WFDD. Today, WFDD's listeners total more than 118,000 weekly, and WFDD continues to be an important part of the Piedmont and High Country through its commitment to local news coverage, its strong community connection, its youth education program with initiatives that take place both at the station and embedded in Winston-Salem/Forsyth County Schools, and its broadcast of nationally-distributed programs from NPR, American Public Media, BBC, and PRX.

In 1994, when Julian retired from Wake Forest University as Professor Emeritus, he began to pursue his passion for art and became an accomplished painter.

Julian Carr Burroughs, Jr., died in 2008.
