Why are we here?

Planning staff received a request to research programs that would recognize historic neighborhoods and their first residents.

In particular, there was an expressed interest in providing plaques for each home in a given neighborhood, perhaps including information about the first owner/occupant and his/her occupation.

Option 1 Existing Historic Marker Program

- What is it?
 - Forsyth County Historic Resources Commission awards 2 markers each year that are funded by the City of Winston-Salem
 - May award up to 2 additional self-funded markers
- Applicant-driven process
- Level of recognition: neighborhood
- Cost: \$2500 per marker, plus staff time to manage program, install marker, plan and execute unveiling event

Option 2 Neighborhood Panel Program

- What is it?
 - Historic resources staff develops content and works with Marketing and Engineering (through bond projects) to place panels with historic neighborhood information in City parks; could expand program to historic neighborhoods
- Staff-driven process
- Level of recognition: neighborhood
- Cost: cost to fabricate panels and mounting apparatus; staff time for research and writing, panel design, installation, and maintenance



Option 3 Neighborhood Sign Program

- What is it?
 - Signs with the historic name of the neighborhood, and sometimes the date of establishment, are placed throughout a historic neighborhood
- Locally, this has been a neighborhood driven and funded process
- Level of recognition: neighborhood
- Cost: cost to fabricate signs and mounting apparatus; staff time for program management, sign design, installation, and maintenance



Option 4 House Plaque Program

- What is it?
 - Signs with the first/significant owners/residents of the house, date of construction, and other information are placed on individual buildings
- Can be applicant- or staff-driven process
- Level of recognition: individual building
- Cost: cost to fabricate signs and mounting apparatus; staff time for program management and publicity; research; sign design, installation, and maintenance

Residents of West End self-manage a program

Owner applies for and pays for the plaque

Old Salem Museums & Gardens manages program

Signs serve as house numbers





Option 4b New Citywide Program


- Surveyed 15 city-wide plaque programs across the country
- Only 2 North Carolina localities have citywide programs
 - Durham and Wilmington, both run by local non-profit
- 9 of the 15 programs are run by non-profits as a form of preservation advocacy
 - Non-profit programs are generally applicant-driven
- 6 of the 15 programs are run by local governments
 - Government programs are generally staff-driven, with properties selected by a historic resources commission


















House Plaque Programs by City Population (in thousands)




Application Information Required by House Plaque Programs

- Historic documentation
 - Significant or first owner(s)
 - Birth/death dates
 - Occupation
 - Construction date
 - Builder and architect names
 - Deed history with owner names & dates
 - Major alterations to the building
 - Building style and materials
- Photographs

Range of House Plaque Costs for Winston-Salem's National Register Historic Districts



Bronze total cost: \$1,870,488 Aluminum total cost: \$746,933

Impacts of Selected House Plaque Programs

Pros

- Increase awareness of local history
- Promote community pride
- Potential increase in property values from "plaque prestige"

Cons

- Confuse citizens about local designation vs. plaque awards
 - Designated properties changed without necessary Certificates of Appropriateness
- Require considerable funds to recognize large numbers of properties
- Consume significant staff time
