## Price per Household

- Rate as of April $1=\$ 1.65$
- Lewisville = \$2.77 (contractor also collects trash)
- Charlotte = \$2.66 (additional costs for backyard)


## Potential Fees

- We currently do not pay any fee for contamination in the material stream
- Proposals could include a fee for excessive contamination past a certain threshold
- Backyard collections and bins could become an additional fee


## Changes to Glass Collection

As of February 2021, the blended value of glass is (-\$25.31)

## Recycling companies and cities are taking glass out of their curbside collections

## Education and Outreach

With potential fees for excessive contamination and the possibility of glass being removed from the curbside program, education will be imperative

Contractor will be asked to do two annual education campaigns and attend the annual Earth Day Fair
