





GANG UNIT AND PREVENTION EFFORTS

WS Police Department's Gang Unit:

- In operation since 2006
- Primary functions: identifying and investigating gangs, gang members, and gang-related crimes.
- Approach to combatting gangs: Prevention, Intervention, and Suppression.
- Partnership: W-S/FC Gang Steering Committee (citizens and community leaders)
- Awards: 2011 & 2016 Gang Unit of the Year,
 Jeremiah Goodson Award (2017 & 2021)

- The WSPD Gang Unit has seized 140 firearms since 2018.
- Assisted the Forsyth County Sheriff's Office (FCSO) in the wake of the shooting at Mt.. Tabor High School
- Provides the FCSO and its School Resource Officers (SRO) with gang intelligence on local gangs.
- Provided gang awareness presentations at Main Street Academy, Mt. Tabor High School and are scheduled for Parkland High School and North Forsyth High School.
- Assisted and/or partnered with NC Department of Probation/Parole, NC Gang Investigators Association, ATF, and other federal agencies.

DOUBLE NUMBER OF SOAR PARTICIPANTS

\$300,000



- Increase the SOAR Program from 8 to 16 participants
- A six-month, 32 hour per week offender re-entry program
- Participants spend 28 hours dedicated to an assigned department and 4 hours that involve professional and personal development.
- Program includes: Work Placement, Professional Development, Personal Development, Mentorship Program, and Graduation.
- Department Placement: Recreation & Parks, Vegetation Management,
 CityLink, Sanitation, Fleet Services, Operations, Field Operations, City/County
 Utilities, Community Development


Cost of stipends for 8 vs. 16 SOAR participants

- 3. Changing social norms
