The enforcement of how tall a fence should be will be by complaints. If a fence is out of code, the neighbor or someone passing by can file a complaint and there is a possibility that it will be torn down.

Council Member Adams said it is a safety issue when you have a tall mason fence and no one can see what is going on behind it. It really affects the urban core of our city.

Council Member Larson said the 6 months may not be enough time for residents to be in compliance.

Council Member Adams said this is information to get it going, it may be 12 or 24 months but we need to get the public input. Safety takes presidence over everything.
